Bored pupils riot as staff walk out! - The Star

A mob of three hundred students ran riot through their school yesterday – because they were bored.

It happened when teachers at the one hundred-staff comprehensive refused to do dinner duties and walked out in a union dispute.

Only the headmaster and two teachers were on duty and they were powerless to act.

People living nearby watched, terrified, as gangs of fifteen- and sixteen-year olds rampaged through the one thousand pupil school at Bideford, Devon, chanting "We want a riot" as they smashed windows.

Police who rushed to the giant complex in seven cars calmed the frantic pupils.

As the afternoon lessons ended the youngsters said they were protesting about being confined to one playground.

"We were bored and had nothing to do," they said. "We will continue our action until the teachers dispute is over.

"We brought screwdrivers and hammers to school and stole knives from the canteen."

- 9. How does this make the article more emotive?
- 10. In your opinion, what is shocking about the article?

Remember to include key features of a newspaper article, which are as follows:

- Make your headline short and snappy.
- In the first sentence sum up what the story is about.
- Write your report in the third person and the past tense.
- Split your newspaper report up into paragraphs and columns to help the reader clearly understand the information.
- If you use quotes to make your report more interesting, don't forget to use speech marks!
- Fill your newspaper report with both facts and opinions. Facts give the reader all of the information they need by using the 5 W's (Who? What? When? Where? Why?).
